Awards for Artists

Background

Paul Hamlyn Foundation launched Awards for Artists to provide individuals with financial assistance at a timely moment in their careers.

This unique scheme has now been running for 22 years and has benefited more than 140 artists with funding of over £5.5m.

Originally supporting a range of art forms, the current scheme focuses on visual artists and composers. Five awards are made to visual artists and three to composers each year.

The Awards reflect the Foundation's strong belief in the value of artists to society. The scheme aims to give artists the freedom to develop their creative ideas and to grow both personally and professionally.

Principles

Focus

The Awards focus on the artists themselves rather than a particular type of practice or genre. They do not prioritise any particular age group and support artists at a critical stage of their career. They consider artists from as broad a spectrum of visual arts practice and composition as possible.

Significant support with no strings attached

Each Award provides three years of support totalling £50,000, which artists are free to use as they see fit. Each individual is given full autonomy to decide how the funding can best support their life and practice as an artist.

Previous recipients have used the Award to help with living costs and purchase equipment, as well to buy time and space to develop new ideas, techniques and work in new media.

An award, not a prize

The Awards are not prizes in any conventional sense, but are instead given on the basis of a mix of factors – talent, promise, tenacity and need, as well as achievement to date.

Confidential process

The identities of each year's nominators and nominees remain confidential throughout. Artists are not told who nominated them, unless they are selected to receive an Award, and the long list of nominated artists is never made public. The recipients of the Awards are announced at a reception in the autumn of each year.

There are 20 nominators for visual artists and 12 for composers. The nominators change each year and are either artists themselves or recognised professionals in related fields.

Each nominator puts forward the names of up to five artists who live and practice in the UK. Each artist is then invited to submit an application that includes biographical details, examples of their work, evidence of financial need and a statement explaining how an Award would help them. Applications are then considered by two panels of judges, one for each category. The visual arts panel is chaired by Jane Hamlyn, Chair of Paul Hamlyn Foundation, and the composers panel is chaired by the pianist and conductor Joanna MacGregor. Panel members change every year, and include at least one artist (often a previous recipient) as well as respected individuals from similar professional backgrounds to the nominators.

The visual arts panel meets over two days to review all applications and to select five recipients. The composers panel reviews all the submitted material in their own time and then comes together for a day to choose three recipients. Judges are not told if artists and composers have been nominated previously.

The quality of the submissions very much depends on the time and thought that each nominator puts into their selections – and the high quality of artists and composers that applied this year was no exception.

Therefore, we would like to thank our nominators not only for identifying artistic talent but also for their appreciation of how this Award will benefit each recipient at a timely moment in their career.

We would also like to thank our judging panel for their commitment towards making these Awards a success. Each year, our judging panel dedicate their time and expertise to the difficult task of identifying award recipients. This year's pool of nominees were of a very high standard.

Awards for Artists 2016 Visual Arts recipients





Lucy Beech and Edward Thomasson have collaborated on performance projects since 2007. Their work is characterised by choreographed group activities that look at how movement is used when language fails or seems hard to summon. At the centre of their work is an exploration of how performance is initiated in non-theatrical environments as a tool for working through everyday emotional and occupational problems and experiences.





Sonia Boyce

Sonia Boyce emerged as one of the leading figures in the Black-British arts scene in the 1980s. Working across several mediums, the heart of her recent work raises questions about the production and reception of unexpected gestures through improvised performances. In 2007, she was awarded an MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours list for services to Art, and in 2016 she became a Royal Academician.

Rachel Reupke

Rachel Reupke is a filmmaker exploring the complexities of interpersonal communication. Her work often draws upon influences from the advertising industry. Two recent films, *Deportment* (2011) and *Wine & Spirits* (2013), used vignettes from alcohol advertising as a starting point to examine social rituals surrounding male-female relationships.



Lucy Skaer

Graduate of the Glasgow School of Art, Lucy Skaer uses image, sculpture and film to explore the limits of image-making and how objects affect and are affected by the spaces in which they are situated. In 2009, her sculptures *Black Alphabet* and *Leviathan Edge* were nominated for the Turner Prize.



Cara Tolmie

London-based artist Cara Tolmie works from within the intersections of performance, music and moving image. Her works probe the site-specific conditions of performance-making. Tolmie does this by finding ways to vocalise and place her body in ways that access the political and poetic capabilities of physical, written and musical languages.

Heather Leigh

Heather Leigh is a West Virginian, Texas-raised composer and singer, based in Glasgow. She is renowned for her spontaneous composition and for redefining the pedal steel guitar. As a solo artist, she explores themes relating to the representation of women, sexuality and vulnerability. She also has an extensive catalogue of collaborative work, including with German saxophonist Peter Brötzmann.

Daniel Kidane

Daniel Kidane is a leading young concert composer from London, whose work ranges from solo pieces to large orchestral works. His work focuses on themes of multi-cultural and multi-linguistic exchanges and how these shape our daily interactions.



Ailís Ní Ríain

Ailís Ní Ríain is a contemporary classical composer and published stage writer currently based in Yorkshire. From acoustic composition to music installations and music-theatre, her work aims to challenge, provoke and engage with new audiences in diverse spaces.
